HOPE IN THE FACE OF HUNGER

In March 2025, the White House announced a pause in certain programs that distribute federal commodities to schools and food pantries. These programs remain paused today. This is a problem, as federal commodities provide many staples in the food system, especially meat, eggs, dairy, flour, and other essential ingredients. Since March, distributions from the Oregon Food Bank—once two semi trucks a week—have fallen by 28 percent.

At the same time, funding from the Oregon legislature that has supported the food bank ended on June 30. That critical funding covered refrigeration costs, truck fuel and maintenance, and the staff managing a warehouse that provides about 84,000 meals monthly. The funding appeared likely to be renewed until an unfavorable revenue forecast created a billion-dollar hole in the state budget.

So, is the sky falling?

Fortunately, no, thanks to the generosity of our community. Despite the loss of commodities, overall food supply is down only 12 percent—and the gap is still shrinking. Donors such as Roundhouse Foundation, Albertson's, Cow Creek Band, and the Marie Lamfrom Foundation have stepped forward to help close the gap. These large gifts, along with smaller individual contributions, are helping keep the region fed. It's humbling to watch such a community response unfold.

We are not out of the woods yet. We know a 20 percent reduction in SNAP benefits is coming, and that will drive even more people to our 58 food partners. But we are preparing to meet this challenge with the continued support of our donors and community. We have met rising hunger head-on, and with your help, we have not backed down from the fight.

FROM DREAM TO DOORSTEP


When Carlos and his wife Elena returned to Central Oregon after living abroad, they were eager to put down roots. But settling into life in the U.S. came with unexpected challenges—especially when it came to affording a place to live. Carlos worked as a landscaper and Elena at a nonprofit, but even with two incomes, the dream of homeownership felt out of reach in an increasingly expensive housing market.

That changed when the couple discovered NeighborImpact's Individual Development Account (IDA) Matched Savings Program. The IDA program helps income-eligible individuals save toward major financial goals—like buying a home—by matching every dollar they save with additional funds. Carlos and Elena applied right away and were thrilled to be accepted.

But it wasn't just the matched funding that made a difference. Through one-on-one sessions with financial counselor Jeff Belzer, Carlos and Elena learned how to manage debt, build credit, budget strategically, and prepare for the homebuying process from start to finish.

"Through the guidance of our wonderful advisor, Jeff Belzer, we gained a wealth of knowledge in the process of buying a home," Carlos said. "From credit reduction techniques, to budgeting, to lender info and so many other helpful tips and tricks for getting ourselves prepared."

With a stronger financial foundation and real savings to support their goal, the couple finally felt ready to purchase their first home—and make their dreams a reality.



CHILD CARE WORKFORCE GROWS



Head Start children were not the only ones to celebrate a graduation milestone at NeighborImpact this summer. Through the Partners in Practice (PIP) program, 152 early childhood educators across Central Oregon took important steps in their careers, with 42 earning credentials ranging from certificates to master's degrees.

Partners in Practice is a transformative scholarship program made possible through a partnership between Central Oregon Community College, the Early Learning Hub of Central Oregon, and NeighborImpact Child Care Resources. Designed for working professionals in the early learning field, the program offers flexible evening, weekend, and online college courses to help participants earn one- or two-year certificates or degrees in early childhood education. Scholarships can cover the full cost of tuition, making higher education more accessible to those shaping the region's youngest learners.

This year, NeighborImpact had a special reason to celebrate: six of the graduates were staff members from within the organization.

"The PIP program is instrumental in increasing the number of high-quality child care slots in Central Oregon," said PIP Specialist Clare Nieto. "We are incredibly proud of our graduates—especially our own staff—and grateful for the opportunity to invest in the future of early learning."
